



Jay and Janette Henderson named Friends of the Foundation

Central Montana Foundation (CMF) honored Jay and Janette Henderson with the Friends of the Foundation award during the Foundation's Annual Meeting on May 26.

Presenting the award, CMF Executive Director Carrie Mantooth praised the couple's lifelong commitment to giving back. "Jay and Janette's generosity and devotion to community reflect the very best of what it means to be Friends of the Foundation," Carrie said.

For Janette, this story begins with family. As the daughter of Jim and Margie Wilkins, she grew up with an example of philanthropy that was part of everyday life. Jim Wilkins was one of the founders of Central Montana Foundation in 1984, and Margie Wilkins became known as the "fairy godmother for Lewistown" nonprofits because of her faithful financial support. Their belief was simple: Lewistown and Central Montana had given much to them, and they wanted to give back. That's the philosophy that Jay and Janette operate under as well.

Jay and Janette's journey began when they were high school sweethearts from Fergus High School's class of 1969. After marrying in 1970, they both earned bachelor's degrees from Montana State University, and Jay later earned his master's. He spent 35 years as a microbiologist with the Montana Department of Livestock in Bozeman, and Janette worked for 26 years at the MSU Bookstore.

Even while making their home in Bozeman, they never lost their bond to Lewistown and the family ranch. They've provided financial support to many Central Montana projects over the years, and in 2018, they were the catalyst to set up a pass-through fund with the Foundation, primarily to raise money to fix the Fergus County Courthouse dome clocks. Jay remembered relying on those clocks as a kid to see if he was running late for school — and he didn't think they should stay broken. Thanks to their efforts, they aren't anymore.

Education has long been a priority for the Henderson family. For the past six years, Jay and Janette have funded scholarships for Fergus High School graduates through CMF. In December, the couple further strengthened their commitment by establishing a deferred charitable gift annuity with the Foundation, with the intent that future proceeds go to their scholarship fund.

One of the most meaningful expressions of their commitment to Central Montana came in late 2024, when Jay and Janette established the Wilkins

Family Donor Advised Fund with the Foundation. The death of her parents in 2000 and 2011 meant the end of the Wilkins name, as Janette was an only child. Setting up the Wilkins Family DAF was a way to make sure that the family name carries on.

The unrestricted Margie Wilkins Estate endowment created through the Wilkins estate has provided thousands upon thousands of dollars in grants for local projects, and the donor-advised fund now gives Jay and Janette the flexibility to respond when needs arise.

The Hendersons said they choose to direct their charitable giving through CMF because they trust the Foundation's mission and stewardship. "The main reason we make CMF the beneficiary of our charitable giving is that we know our dollars are going back into the Lewistown community," Jay said. "We have seen firsthand the benefits that CMF has had on the people of Central Montana. We have also been impressed by the board's commitment to its fiduciary and administrative responsibilities. Giving through CMF ensures local philanthropy while maintaining some of the lowest administrative costs of any organization that I know of."

Another connection with the Henderson family and the Foundation is through their son, Brian, who has served on the CMF Board of Directors since 2015 as a representative of Fergus Federal Credit Union, and has been a Foundation officer since 2021. Brian brought his own family back to Lewistown in 2011, making his sons the sixth generation on the Wilkins side to live in Central Montana.

The Hendersons said being named Friends of the Foundation is a tremendous honor. "Knowing that our contributions are being recognized and that they play a small part in strengthening the fabric of Lewistown brings us great joy," Jay said. "Central Montana, as we all know, is a special place. Above all, it is home to special people. To us, giving is about investing in the future of our neighbors and protecting our local heritage. We look forward to continuing our partnership with CMF as it helps make Central Montana an even better place."

In recognizing the Hendersons, Central Montana Foundation leaders praised their generosity, vision, and enduring love for Central Montana — qualities that have created a lasting legacy and strengthened the communities they cherish.

Another group partnered with the Lewistown Soccer Club to mow grounds, clear rocks from fields, and plant trees to enhance the space for local athletes and families.

A great example of the bank's ongoing commitment to youth and education is its School Supply Giveaway. In Lewistown alone, 380 backpacks filled with supplies were distributed to local students. Employees assemble and distribute the supplies each summer, helping ensure students start the school year prepared and supported.

First Bank (formerly First National Bank) is also responsible for jump-starting nine of the 11 community foundations (see list on Page 7), and continues to support a growing list of projects throughout Central Montana communities.

"I'm so proud to be part of this community and to be affiliated with a community foundation that has done so much good," Dean said. "It's really something special." ❖

CMF celebrates growth and community impact at Annual Meeting

More than 100 people gathered at the Yogo Inn on May 26 as Central Montana Foundation (CMF) celebrated another year of growth, generosity, and community impact during its Annual Meeting and Luncheon.

2025 Activities Reports

Reports from CMF President Dean Comes, Certified Public Accountant Stacie Arntzen, and Executive Director Carrie Mantooth highlighted a year marked by significant growth in assets, charitable giving, scholarships, and grantmaking throughout Central Montana.

The Foundation administers nearly 325 permanent endowments and pass-through funds benefiting nonprofit and tax-exempt organizations. During 2025, the Foundation's Board of Directors approved 16 new endowments, including two established by Winifred native Norman Asbjornson. Mr. Asbjornson contributed more than \$16.5 million in 2025 to funds supporting community improvements in Winifred.

In her report, Stacie Arntzen said contributions to CMF funds exceeded \$21 million in 2025, including gifts of cash, stock, retirement assets, charitable gift annuities, and estate distributions. More than \$1.2 million was contributed to unrestricted funds, including significant gifts from the Sue Glenn Duffy Estate and an anonymous estate. CMF granted \$193,000 from its undesignated funds in 2025 to community projects, and expects that number will grow with the additional undesignated funds. Those unrestricted gifts help make local grantmaking possible.

In his presentation, Dean Comes said, "One of the most rewarding parts of serving on the CMF Board is being able to help fund projects that strengthen communities across Central Montana."

"While CMF's total assets reached nearly \$64 million at the end of 2025 and are now approaching \$70 million, grantmaking is funded through unrestricted permanent endowments, which totaled just over \$11.6 million at year-end. In 2025, CMF awarded \$193,000 from its undesignated funds to community projects and expects that figure to continue growing.

Carrie Mantooth reported that nearly \$600,000 in scholarships was awarded to 141 Central Montana students during 2025. CMF administers more than 80 scholarship funds, with additional schol-

arship awards distributed through donor-advised funds, rural community endowments, and nonprofit organizations served by the Foundation. She also announced that CMF will implement new scholarship software this year and transition to electronic applications.

Other highlights from CMF's Annual Meeting included recognition of Jay and Janette Henderson as the 2025 Friends of the Foundation, and presentation of an appreciation plaque to former CMF Director Jennifer Weeden for her years of dedicated service (see related stories on Pages 1 and 2).

Major Grant Awards

Major grants (requests of \$5,000+) are considered just once per year, and applicants were at the Annual Meeting to give short presentations about their requests. Major grant funding is primarily from

earnings from the Mildred Bryte Estate endowment held with CMF.

The Foundation received a record 16 major grant requests totaling \$505,400. During the meeting, Fergus County Council on Aging withdrew its \$10,000 request after receiving an unexpected donor gift that fully funded the project, bringing the total request amount to \$495,400 from 15 organizations.

CMF awarded a total of \$100,000 to seven of the applicants. This year's successful major grant recipients include:

- **Beaver Creek/Cottonwood Creek Fire District:** \$12,000 to help purchase two utility terrain vehicles equipped with fire skids, improving wildfire response capabilities and reducing response times.
- **Central Montana Medical Center:** \$25,000 to aid in purchasing a nuclear medicine camera, essential for diagnosing cancer and heart disease – often before symptoms appear.
- **Fergus Center for the Performing Arts:** \$15,000 for sound and projection upgrades in the Fergus Center for the Performing Arts at Fergus High School, which hosts school and community events year-round.
- **Highland Park Elementary:** \$15,000 to help purchase new handicapped accessible playground equipment, replacing the existing 30-year-old swing set and play structure.
- **Hobson Public School:** \$5,000 to help replace the non-func-

Portable Pet Scan expands cancer services at CMMC

"By offering local PET/CT imaging, cancer patients are getting results faster and starting appropriate lifesaving treatment sooner than when they had to travel out of town."

That's how Helmsley Cancer Center manager Amy d'Autremont described the impact of a new service offered by Central Montana Medical Center. Starting in January, CMMC began partnering with United Imaging-Shared Medical Services to bring to Lewistown a portable digital PET/CT service every other week.

"This helps detect cancer at a metabolic level, so we are able to see the metastasis of cancer that you can't with other imagery," said Heather Haynes, CMMC's radiology manager. "Most PET/CT scanners in Montana are still analog, so our technology is top of the line."

The imaging, a vital part of determining the best treatment plans for cancer patients, requires only eight to 13 minutes, although the preparation period beforehand can last up to one hour.

"We can diagnose and stage locally," said Haynes. "It keeps patients from traveling out of town. Patients and families are very happy they can do it here. And it also saves them from invasive biopsies."

CMMC needs an average of five scans every other week to justify bringing in the portable service and already is averaging six. Some patients have already had their third local PET/CT scan.

"Having the local availability of PET/CT not only means less travel and expense to the patient but a faster turnaround of the results to the oncologist," said d'Autremont.

Both d'Autremont and Haynes said CMMC is now studying the possibility of bringing prostate-specific scanning to Central Montana.

Helmsley Cancer Center celebrates its First Anniversary

The Helmsley Cancer Center at Central Montana Medical Center recently marked its first anniversary. While the occasion passed without the fanfare of the grand opening celebration on June 6, 2025—when more than 300 people gathered to commemorate the three-year effort to build the facility—the milestone is one worth celebrating.

Over the past year, the 16,712-square-foot Cancer Center has fulfilled its mission of bringing "Hope Close to Home" by providing comprehensive cancer care to patients throughout Central Montana.

According to Medical Center Foundation Director Abby Franks, utilization of the Cancer Center has exceeded expectations during its first year of operation. In its first 12 months, the Center recorded 2,727 infusion visits, 807 radiation treatments, 326 radiation oncology clinic appointments, and 928 medical oncology appointments.

The impact extends far beyond those numbers. By offering compre-

hensive cancer services locally, the Center has significantly reduced the need for patients to travel long distances for treatment. During its first year alone, an estimated 478,152 miles of travel were avoided, saving patients and their families considerable time, fuel expenses, lodging costs, and other travel-related costs.

"There has been so much accomplished at CMMC for cancer care over the last few years; it's really amazing and a wonderful thing," Abby said. "There continue to be advancements in technology that help identify and treat cancer, and CMMC wants to keep pace with those advancements. Therefore, gifts will always be important."

CMMC raising funds to replace Nuclear Medicine Camera

Central Montana Medical Center (CMMC) is continuing a multi-year effort to upgrade and replace radiology equipment to ensure patients have access to advanced diagnostic services close to home. Recent investments have included upgrades to mammography, DEXA, MRI, and ultrasound technology, with an \$800,000 CT scanner upgrade planned for later this year.

An unexpected equipment failure, however, has created an urgent need.

"CMMC worked to extend the life of the current camera as long as possible, but it recently reached the end of its usable life because a critical replacement part is no longer available," said Medical Center Foundation Director Abby Franks.

Nuclear medicine imaging plays a vital role in diagnosing conditions such as heart disease, cancer, bone disorders, and organ function abnormalities—often before symptoms appear. For patients in rural



communities, having access to these advanced diagnostic services close to home is essential.

"This service is currently paused," said CMMC Radiology Manager Heather Haynes. "It's difficult knowing patients must leave town to receive this care."

The cost of a replacement Nuclear Medicine Camera is \$285,585. Funding efforts are already underway, including a \$25,000 grant from Central Montana Foundation, nearly \$18,000 in community donations, and almost \$3,400 raised through the CMMC Employee Giving Campaign. Together, these contributions have reduced the remaining need to approximately \$240,000.

MCF is actively seeking additional support and hope to have the new equipment installed and operational by October. For more information about supporting this project, contact Abby Franks at afranks@cmmccares.com or call 406-535-6309. ❖

CMMC Employee Giving Campaign triples giving percentage!

Central Montana Medical Center employees showed an inspiring commitment to giving this year, tripling participation in the Employee Giving Campaign from 22% to 66%.

Medical Center Foundation Director Abby Franks credited Tim and Shana Rose as the catalysts for the dramatic increase. The couple pledged \$35,000 towards refreshing employee breakrooms if staff reached 60% employee giving participation. Employees exceeded that goal, reaching 66% participation and securing the gift.

In all, 199 employees chose to give, helping the campaign raise a little more than \$40,000.

"It is because of the care, kindness, and attitudes that I received from you in December 2024 that I so appreciate CMMC and am providing this incentive," said Tim Rose in a message to CMMC employees.

An early success story is that the additional support will help with the purchase of a bladder scanner for CMMC.

The breakroom refresh will focus on improving 19 spaces throughout the organization. Department managers are working with staff to identify priorities, with larger needs such as tables, chairs, refrigerators, ice machines and other shared amenities considered first. The project is intended to support employees in the spaces where they rest, gather for meals and connect during busy workdays, with an effort to purchase locally when possible.

The campaign's success reflects the culture that makes CMMC so special, according to Abby. Employees care for their patients, coworkers, and the community like family. ❖

Marie Jones gifts to local organizations are from the heart

At 95 years old, Marie Jones still believes in giving back.

After selling the Lewistown home she and her late husband, Elden, built in 1973, Marie decided to donate a significant portion of the proceeds to causes close to her heart: the Boys and Girls Club of Lewistown and the Fergus County Council on Aging. The gifts are in memory of Elden and a grandson, Brian Meier, who died in 2008.

"I wanted to give it to places that were important to me that need the money," Marie said. "It makes me feel so good to be able to help."

For Marie, generosity is a natural extension of a life spent working hard, serving others, and investing in her community.

A lifelong Central Montana resident, Marie was born in Moore in 1931, and was the oldest of five children born to her parents, Henry and Esther Flugge.

Marie graduated from Buffalo High School in 1949, and went to work as a rural mail carrier in Buffalo the following

year. In 1962, she began working as a rural mail carrier out of Lewistown. She retired in 1993, after a career of 40+ years. Marie enjoyed traveling roads throughout Central Montana and building friendships with the people she served. Along the way, she became active in the Montana Rural Mail Carriers Association and eventually served as its president.

Marie's gift to the Boys and Girls Club is rooted in years of volunteer service at the Central Montana Fair. As chair of the floral department for 12 years, she welcomed Club members into the exhibits building, where they created flower arrangements and decorated vegetables for display. "The Boys and Girls Club brought the kids in, and I'd let them decorate," she recalled. That tradition continues today. According to the Club's CEO Amy Vaughan, dozens of floral arrangements created by Club youth will be displayed at this year's fair.

Marie said she believes in the Club's mission of providing a safe, positive place for young people. "They keep kids active and learning," she said. "That's important."

Amy said Marie's gift "makes a tremendous difference in the Club's ability to serve kids and families well each and every day." She said they are honored that Marie believes in the Club's mission and has entrusted them with resources that will help support future generations. "There are so many ways that this community has supported the Club over the last 25 years, and this gift speaks to the continued trust in the work and the kids of the future that drives us forward."

Council on Aging Executive Director Lonnie Mannin said the unexpected gift arrived at just the right time, helping address an aging walk-in freezer and other pressing needs. "Marie's generosity is especially meaningful because she's experienced our services firsthand," Lonnie added. "Her gifts will help ensure that older adults in our community continue to have access to nutritious meals, reliable transportation, and other programs. We're so grateful for her support and for the confidence she has placed in our mission."

Throughout her life, Marie has also been known for her love of gardening. She and Elden maintained a large garden, and she devoted countless volun-

teer hours to gardening organizations, including serving as president of the Montana Federation of Garden Clubs, and a regional director. Her favorite flowers were peonies and daffodils, and today her apartment at the Villa remains filled with thriving plants and flowers. Jigsaw puzzles are also one of her favorite hobbies, and nearly an entire wall of her finished puzzles are displayed in a sitting area at the Villa.

Family has always been at the center of Marie's life. She and her first husband, Jim Mundy, had three children—Wayne, Scott, and Nina. Marie speaks fondly of Wayne's ex-wife, Mary Lou, whom she considers a daughter. Today, her family includes nine grandchildren and a growing number of great- and great-great-grandchildren living throughout the United States and beyond.

Marie married Elden Jones in 1962, and together they made their home on the family ranch south of Lewistown, where she enjoyed the beautiful view of the Judith Mountains and a life built around hard work, family, and community.

Looking back on her life, Marie is grateful for the opportunity to support the community that supported her. "I appreciate being able to give back to the community where I made my living on the ranch and carrying mail," she said.

Her gifts are a reminder that generosity isn't measured by age, but by a lifetime of commitment to family, friends, and community.

- **Rural Behavioral Health Institute:** \$8,000 to provide free school-based mental health screenings for students in grades 6-12

throughout Central Montana.

The Medical Center Foundation (MCF) Advisory Board members have been busy spending money that enhance healthcare services, support staff development, and improve the patient experience at Central Montana Medical Center and throughout the community.

During the past quarter, MCF Advisory Board recommended the following awards from the following MCF funds:

From the General Fund

- \$21,539 for a bariatric bed for the Acute Care Department to improve patient safety and comfort.

- \$500 for the bicycle helmet giveaway at the Ready, Set, Summer Safety Event.

- \$480 for the Fergus High School After-Prom Party helped provide a safe and substance-free after-prom celebration.

From the Education Fund

- \$1,000 was awarded to help CMMC's Laboratory Manager attend a national laboratory conference to bring industry knowledge and best practices back to the whole team.

From the Cancer Center Fund

- \$1,500 will support the Cancer Support Community Montana, which offers critical support to cancer patients - including local individuals and families - through educational resources, travel assistance, information services, and support groups.

From the Friends of First Responders Fund

- \$2,116 will help with CPR certification costs for local EMT volunteers, helping ensure continued access to trained emergency responders throughout our region.

From Darci's Gift-Save a Life Fund

- \$2,500 will help 82 Fergus High School sophomores in obtaining CPR and First Aid certifications, equipping students with lifesaving skills that can benefit their families, schools, and communities.

From the Nursing Excellence Fund

- \$885 provided support for Oncology Nursing Certification for two Registered Nurses.

- \$1,120 help two nurses participate in the Montana Breastfeeding Learning Collaborative, expanding their expertise and strengthening

maternal and infant care services.

- \$892 assisted a phlebotomist in pursuing prerequisite coursework for a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN), investing in the development of the future nursing workforce.

- \$500 supported Hospital Week activities that celebrated staff, strengthened team connections, and recognized the commitment of those who provide exceptional care to our patients and community.

- \$625 helped with Certified Nursing Assistant education and certification for a newly hired employee, strengthening the future healthcare workforce in our community.

From the Hospice Fund

- \$5,532 was awarded for bariatric bed frames to support over-sized bariatric mattresses already purchased for patient care, enhancing safety, comfort, and dignity for larger patients. The mattresses also provide space for a loved one to rest alongside a hospice patient.

From the Today Fund

Donor-designated gifts helped the following projects:

- \$41,255 for Acute Care will help with room remodels and patient room improvements, helping create a comfortable, healing environment.

- \$3,000 updated two postpartum rooms in the Obstetrics Department with a fresh coat of paint, creating a more welcoming, comfortable, and healing environment.

- \$3,091 helped purchase a water birth pool

and sterile kits to provide additional comfort-focused labor options for mothers in the OB Department. Water labor has been shown to promote relaxation, improve patient satisfaction, and support a more positive birth experience.

- \$350 from a donor-designated gift helped create a welcome wall in the OB Department for staging or taking photos as families celebrate the birth of new babies and the beginning of a new chapter.

- \$1,174 from the Sonny Moline Memorial Fund helped the Acute Care Department recognize and celebrate Nurses Week, honoring the nurses whose skill, compassion, and dedication make a meaningful difference in the lives of patients and families.

- \$2,500 was granted by Town Pump for an EMT to pursue paramedic education, helping expand the availability of highly trained emergency medical professionals in our region.

- \$150,000 in donor support made possible the purchase of a C-Arm, which is a mobile imaging device that provides real-time X-ray guidance during surgical, orthopedic, and pain management procedures, improving precision and patient care.

From the Hospice and Home Health Fund

- \$4,073 was granted to help launch an evidence-based Music Therapy pilot program in Hospice and Home Health. Music therapy has been shown to reduce anxiety, improve mood, foster emotional connection and expression, and enhance quality of life, offering comfort, healing, and support to patients and their loved ones.

From the HOPE Fund

- \$3,562 from the HOPE fund helped four CMMC employees in crisis. The HOPE Fund is primarily funded through employee giving and is used to help co-workers navigate unexpected emergencies.

Central Montana Foundation awards grants across the region

The Central Montana Foundation (CMF) Board of Directors continues its commitment to strengthening communities across the region through another round of grants made possible by income from its unrestricted permanent endowments.

This latest cycle supports youth programs, education, public health, recreation, and community development initiatives throughout Central Montana.

Awards over the last quarter include:

• **Boys and Girls Club of Lewistown:**

A grant of \$3,000 was awarded to support for transportation costs to the Lewistown City Pool for swimming lessons for approximately 30 Club youth, helping reduce financial barriers for families already covering lesson and pool pass expenses.

• **Elks 0456:** CMF awarded \$2,443.99 for the installation of a new water fountain and bottle filling station at the Elks golf course, which hosts year-round tournaments and youth and adult activities.

• **Grass Range Rodeo Club:** A \$3,000 grant will help support ongoing renovations at the Grass Range Stockyards & Event Center, including infrastructure improvements such as cement, gravel, utilities, and maintenance needs.

• **Silver Spurs 4-H Club:** CMF Directors awarded \$3,000 to help with a progressive four-clinic educational horsemanship series held throughout the spring and summer.

• **Central Montana Family Planning:** \$4,500 in funding was awarded for the "Sun Bus," which will be at the Chokecherry Festival in Lewistown on September 12 to provide skin cancer screening services and prevention education.

• **CMMC Auxiliary:** CMF once again partnered with CMMC Auxiliary to provide \$1,000 in funding for scholarship awards to local students pursuing a healthcare major.

• **Denton Child Development Center:** A \$2,000 grant will help make Improvements to playground equipment to meet childcare licensing requirements and enhance safety and accessibility.

• **District 6 HRDC:** CMF granted \$4,000 in support for Adult Education and HiSET programming to help individuals earn a high school equivalency diploma.

• **Lewistown Youth Baseball & Softball Association:** \$4,500 will help with ongoing improvements to local baseball and softball fields at Symmes Park in Lewistown.

• **Lewistown Area Chamber of Commerce:** CMF granted \$4,999 for the annual 4th of July celebration, helping offset rising fireworks and event costs.

• **Make it Happen:** A \$2,500 grant was awarded in support for the Centerfest Music Festival expenses, including artist lodging and fence rental, helping ensure the event's continued success. This year's festival is Saturday, Aug. 1.

• **Montana DNRC Northeastern Land Office:** \$2,500 was awarded for a community education event held June 11 to educate the public on wildfire prevention, water safety, sun exposure, wildlife safety, invasive species prevention, responsible recreation, and more.

• **Moore School BPA:** \$1,600 was awarded to help with travel expenses for eight students who qualified for the National BPA Convention in Nashville.

• **Moore School FCCLA:** A \$2,200 grant will help 11 students with travel expenses to the National FCCLA Conference in

Washington, D.C.

• **Snowy Mountain Development Corporation:** CMF Directors awarded \$2,000 to help purchase safety and security equipment for the organization's newly acquired facility.

• **Stanford School BPA:** A grant award of \$1,800 will help with travel expenses for the nine students qualifying for the National BPA competition in Nashville.

• **Fergus County Community Council:** A \$4,108.50 grant funded from the Nancy Watts Estate Endowment held with CMF will support a visual display at the Fergus County Fairgrounds honoring the Civilian Conservation Corps.

• **Lewistown Park and Recreation:** CMF Directors awarded \$4,950 for summer pool passes for families in need, helping ensure access to recreational opportunities for local youth. A portion of funding comes from the Summer Youth Programs Fund.

"These grants reflect CMF's ongoing commitment to investing in programs and projects that improve life across Central Montana," said CMF President Dean Comes. "This is achieved through the generosity of donors and the careful stewardship of endowment earnings."
